This workshop will provide a general overview of the special education process, benefits of collaboration in the process; how Special Education Mediation Services (SEMS) supports collaboration; and federal and state resources which support families and schools. Participants will be able to: 1. Learn basic special education legal framework; 2. Define SEMS services including applicability, comparison to complaints and accessing; 3. Describe an overview of special education process; and 4. Identify special education resources.
  - 2. Paving the Way for Effective Community Participation in Wraparound**

One of the challenges faced by wraparound implementations is assuring that potential team members and their colleagues know enough about wraparound to be effective supporters of the process. This session is designed to allow participants to consider factors in developing a plan to address this need on the local level. Audience considerations, content planning and delivery strategies will be highlighted. Participants will have an opportunity to develop an initial implementation plan for their priority concerns related to this topic during this session. Participants will be able to: 1. Learn key target audiences for developing community support for wraparound implementation; 2. Examine key content to communicate to target audiences who can support effective wraparound implementation; and 3. Learn and prioritize a variety of tools and strategies for effectively orienting community partners to wraparound.

A family of five, in recovery, will share their story on how family resilience has helped them bounce back from disruptive life challenges, stronger and more connected. They will share how their experience has helped them to become more skillful while facing ongoing stressors and crises. Each family member will briefly share their personal recovery story. Those attending will learn to apply skills and concepts to the recovery journeys of families with challenges. Materials will be based on research and presented through power points, personal testimony, and audience participation. Participants will be able to: 1. Observe what a family in recovery looks like; 2. Learn how to apply concepts of resilience to their own families and others; 3. Learn how mental illness and resiliency directly impact children; 4. Learn how a child's illness and recovery directly impacts parent's mental health and vice versa; 5. Learn how seeking recovery and building family resiliency brings families closer together and establishes greater connection with the community; and 6. Learn how to use resilience to actively work through a family crisis.



#### **4. Disrupting Assumptions in Clinical Care: Why Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders Matter**

FASDs are exceptionally common in society, though few recognize or understand the disorder. This is especially true in the mental health, allied health, educational, and medical fields. As a result, children and adults with an FASD often go undiagnosed and treatment services applied are ineffective for managing their condition. In this introductory session, we will explore the basics of FASD, including prevalence, common symptoms/signs of the disorder, diagnostic and treatment options, and why we have so many with the disorder, but so few diagnosed. We will also discuss resources available in Michigan, how providers and families can access these resources, and ways to help build new resources through already existing state and private systems. Participants will be able to: 1. Describe the effects of alcohol on embryonic and fetal development; 2. Identify primary disabilities associated with FASD, including issues with speech-language skills, emotional and state regulation, cognition, social skills, and other related developmental issues; and 3. Describe secondary conditions that develop due to a lack of environmental and treatment goodness of fit with the child's/adult's needs and ways to address the reduction of secondary conditions.

This session will review the latest reports on the impacts of Wraparound services for children and youth, frequently asked questions, and an interactive demonstration on report-building in REDCap. Michigan's Adoption and Guardianship Assistance Office (AGAO) works with upwards of 25,000 families who have finalized adoptions and/or subsidized guardianships for children that would have otherwise remained in the State of Michigan's child welfare system. In this interactive breakout session, the Adoption and Guardianship Assistance Office will provide a brief overview of their office's duties including Adoption Assistance, Guardianship Assistance, and Medical Subsidy programs. Immediately following the overview, there will be a panel question & answer discussion to be led by participants. Q & A focus will be on methods of working together to assist families and providers with services and supports offered through the AGAO. Whether you have an active case with the office, are a foster parent with a child(ren) whose goal is guardianship or adoption or are a partnering agency service provider and want to better understand what the Adoption and Guardianship Assistance Office can provide, you can benefit from this session. Please come prepared with questions you have for their office to get the most out of this session. Participants will be able to: 1. Identify the purpose of the Adoption and Guardianship Assistance Office; 2. Understand how agency partners and families can best work with AGAO; and 3. Identify resources for post adoption and guardianship services.

**7. Supervising to the Model: Using Family Feedback to Improve Consistency**

#### **9. How Wraparound Helped my Family by Seeing What Was Visible and Invisible**

- *Lori Abraham, Certified Parent Support Partner, Macomb County CMH Services*

This session will provide an outline of a family's journey and experience with the SED waiver including other EBTs: TFCBT, FMF, PMTO. The presenters will describe the benefits and barriers to services/approaches; and provide advice and tools on how to identify the 'true needs' within a family in order to steer team direction. You will receive guidance on how to meet parents and families where they are while continuing to show empathy for child AND parent throughout the process. (An activity will be provided). Participants will be able to: 1. Understand the pressures placed on parents by seeing things from a different perspective (what's on your plate activity); 2. Learn how to dig deeper with identifying needs and alternative ways to meet needs; and 3. Receive a basic understanding of EBTs - TFCBT, FMF, PMTO and when to recommend, timing, team direction-family voice in treatment approach/direction.

#### **10. Michigan Adoption Resources Exchange: Services to Support along the Adoption Journey**

The Michigan Adoption Resource Exchange (MARE) is a statewide information and referral service for families interested in adopting children from foster care, and for adoption workers looking for homes for these children. Beginning with the website photolisting of youth who are waiting for adoption, to adoption navigators to Match Support, MARE is excited to partner with you in helping support families on their adoption journeys to be strong forever families for youth. Participants will be able to: 1. Explore MARE photolisting and website services; 2. Understand the Adoption Navigator Program and how they support families prior to becoming matched; and 3. Describe the Match Support Program and how it supports families after they are matched.

#### **11. Wrapping Around Substance Impacted Families**

Success stories from working with our Substance Use Disorder (SUD) funded Wraparound services will be shared. Neo Natal Wraparound targets pregnant SUD clients while SUD Wrap serves addicted clients parenting children ages 0-18 years. The key role of the Peer Recovery Mentor in reducing stigma and engaging substance impacted families will be highlighted. Multiple pathways to recovery will be reviewed. The importance of facilitating and coordinating among systems partners (CPS, Probation, Foster Care, SUD providers) will be demonstrated. Participants will be able to: 1. Better understand the multiple pathways to recovery; 2. Receive an increased understanding of the key role of the Peer Recovery Mentor; and 3. Increase their knowledge around the benefits of using the Wraparound Process with the SUD population.

## 12. Adaptations as Youth Get Older: How Facilitators Adjust

Wraparound emphasizes the role of parent and youth voice as a critical process element. As youth get older the range and scope of their voice changes in the wraparound process. This session will examine ways these changes can be supported by changes in the way facilitators work with the youth and teams they get to support. Participants will be able to: 1. Identify key practice areas that impact the management of youth voice in the wraparound process; and 2. Learn and practice adaptations in their facilitation style that will support teams and family members in responding to a youth's changing voice.

### 13. Use of the Choice Voucher and the SEDW

The Choice Voucher System allows families in the Serious Emotional Disturbance Waiver to choose and directly hire providers to implement the supports and services for their children. Families have control over resources allocated in their Child's Wraparound Plan, and greater flexibility in tailoring supports to meet individual needs. This presentation will describe the difference between self-determination for adults and the Choice Voucher System for Children. It will also identify and describe the steps to implementing the Choice Voucher System, and advantage and responsibilities of families. Participants will be able to: 1. Gain an understanding of self-directed care (Choice Voucher) for children; 2. Develop an understanding of how to explain/present the option of the Choice Voucher to the family and team; and 3. Wraparound facilitators will gain skills to efficiently support families through the process of utilizing Choice Voucher (Self-Directed) services.

### 14. Working with Youth on the Autism Spectrum

In this interactive session we will cover effective practices for working with youth with autism spectrum disorder. We will cover common myths, as well as the diagnostic criteria for autism spectrum disorder. We will discuss the strengths and challenges of this disorder with a focus on utilizing the strengths to create effective treatment plans. Evidenced-based practices will be explored with time to practice and process new skills. Participants will be able to: 1. Identify the unique strengths and challenges of youth with autism spectrum disorder; and 2. Learn how to apply best practices when working with youth with autism spectrum disorder.

### 15. From Crisis Management to Resilience Building

Far too often Wraparound Care Coordinators and team members focus on controlling a crisis and "dealing with it" the 10 minutes before it happens until it's over. This workshop will focus on crisis events as an opportunity to build resilience with youth and families by developing an understanding of what's driving the situation for the family, using that understanding to identify pathways for self-management and using that information to manage team perspectives and build a language for the family to "own" the events. Participants will be able to: 1. Identify how "crisis" situations relate to unmet needs; and 2. Develop and apply needs statements that are linked to the family's meaning and language about a crisis situation.

### 16. Youth Peer Support: Introduction and Building Effective Partnerships

Youth Peer Support (YPS) is a new peer-to-peer service available to youth in the public mental health system. This training will provide an introduction to YPS, including an explanation of the role Youth Peer Support Specialists (YPSSs) play within Wraparound teams, purpose and benefits of having a YPSS and an overview of the MDHHS approved training model. Organizational and community



readiness and integration of YPSSs into the team will be discussed. Examples of how YPSSs are utilized in various communities will be shared. Participants will be able to: 1. Explain Youth Peer Support (YPS) Medicaid Service; 2. Review and identify Youth Peer Support Specialist (YPSS) qualifications, role and benefits of service; 3. Describe an overview of MDHHS Training Model; and 4. Learn how to effectively partner with YPSSs to support youth within Wraparound teams.

##### **17. Eating Disorders in Adolescence**

- *Agnes Ward, PhD, LP, CAADC, Administrator, Clinical Strategy and Improvement Department, Macomb County CMH Services*

This presentation will focus on identifying eating disorders; anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa, and binge-eating disorder in adolescents. Updates to diagnostic criteria as indicated in the DSM-5 will be discussed. Differences between family dynamics, personality characteristics and control factors will be identified as they relate to each of the eating disorders. Medical complications and co-occurring substance use disorders will be identified. Models on eating disorders theories will be discussed along with evidence-based treatments. Participants will be able to: 1. Identify diagnostic criteria for anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa, and binge-eating disorder; 2. Summarize the differentiating characteristics of each type of eating disorder; and 3. Identify the co-occurring disorders and medical complications related to eating disorders.

##### **18. Navigating the Waiver Support Application**

This presentation will focus on the use of the Waiver Support Application (WSA) to manage the Waiver for Children with Serious Emotional Disturbance (SEDW). WSA users from both the state and local CMHSP will co-present the session which will focus on step-by-step instructions on how to navigate the WSA, enter required information for initial applications and recertifications. This session will also cover helpful hints, report functions and all management aspects of the waiver. Participants will be able to: 1. Become proficient at navigating the WSA; 2. Enter required information for initial application and recertification; and 3. Utilize the WSA reporting features to manage SEDW cases and minimize finance/accounting issues.

##### **19. The Opioid Crisis: Overdose Epidemic and Use of Naloxone**

This is a lecture by law Enforcement Officers on the current opioid crisis, the overdose epidemic and use of naloxone. Current trends of prescription abuse, theft and illegal distribution will also be discussed. Due to the dangers in working in this area strategies will be addressed pertaining to how to keep yourself safe. Participants will be able to: 1. Learn about the impact of the opioid crisis, and the overdose epidemic; 2. Identify various addiction treatments; 3. Learn about impact of other drugs; 4. Describe how Naloxone is saving lives and how you can help; and 5. Identify strategies for work safety.

##### **20. Ideas for When Your Team Seems Stuck**

Wraparound team processes ebb and flow over time. Unfortunately, this includes times when teams seem “stuck”; not energized, not making enough difference, and other challenges. This session will examine ways for facilitators to bring life and focus back to teams that are struggling. Areas examined will include team membership, team process, meeting process adaptations, and other tools designed to bring energy back to the process. Participants will be able to: 1. Examine key reasons teams lose energy and focus in the wraparound process; 2. Learn tools and strategies for revitalizing the meeting process; and 3. Learn tools for proactively managing and responding to this area of concern.

## Concurrent Workshops

### 21. Technology Applications and Trends Involving Today's Youth

- *Gordon Armstrong, Mobile Forensics, Detective Specialist Trooper, Michigan State Police Computer Crimes Unit*

This presentation focuses on the current technology trends that are commonly used by today's youth. It will touch on the types of technology and popular applications, the un-intended use of applications and some of the dangers associated with social media. Participants will be able to: 1. This will include identifying what Wraparound elements can't change when utilizing evidence-based practices. Participants will be able to: 1. #### **25. Wraparound Facilitator's Roles & Responsibilities within the SEDW**

- *Monica Erickson, BS, QIDP, Waiver Data Analyst, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services*
- *Angelo Powell, BA, RS, Specialist, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services*

This presentation will focus on the Wraparound Facilitator's role and responsibilities as related to the SEDW. It will include a review of the SEDW, eligibility criteria, documentation needed for application, and how to orient a family to the SEDW. The presenters will also review how to assist the family with applying for Medicaid, once approved for the SEDW. Participants will be able to: 1. Understand the importance of being able to adequately orient a family to the SEDW; 2. Understand the important role and responsibilities of Wraparound in the SEDW; and 3. Be familiar with how to support a family in applying for Medicaid after being approved for the SEDW.

#### **26. New Initiatives and Collaboration within Child Welfare**

- *Claudine Falkowski, MSW, Mental Health and Child Welfare Partnership Analyst, Division of Mental Health Services for Children and Families, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services*
- *Liz Evans, BS, Family Community Services, Behavioral Health Analyst, Child Welfare Medical Unit, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services*

This session will outline the expanding partnership opportunities for workers that are arising out of changes motivated by the recent state audit, FFPSA and expansion of the SED Waiver. The presenters will provide an overview of these initiatives, as well as community and agency level impact. Key points of collaboration between systems will be explored. The presenters will discuss role and language differences and how to use engagement strategies to enhance working relationships. Participants will be able to: 1. Recite a general overview of the CPS state audit, FFPSA and expansion of the SED Waiver; 2. Identify at least three common barriers to collaboration; 3. Describe three strategies for increasing cross system participation.

#### **27. Effectively Managing System Partnerships in Teams**

- *Neil Brown, BA Social Welfare, President, Neil Brown Consulting, Inc.*

Wraparound teams are composed of a variety of community stakeholders. One of these groups, often over-represented in teams is staff from other systems. System roles, mandates, and concerns are elements that present themselves in different ways in individualized wraparound teams. There are times when negotiating and maintaining effective partnerships between the family, these providers, and wraparound staff leads to challenges in communication and decision making. This session will examine tools and processes intended to help facilitators maintain this balance of perspectives in an effective way while staying true to the wraparound process and principles. Participants will be able to: 1. Examine the role of system mandates and the ways they can complement the wraparound process; 2. Learn tools and strategies for addressing the interpersonal dynamics that these mandate differences can create within a team; 3. Identify process tools designed to improve interprofessional communication within a team context.

#### **28. Following Through: Using Plans to Maintain Organization in Wraparound**

It's easy to get lost in the Wraparound process. When this occurs, you end up staying busy but not producing for either families or Wraparound staff. This workshop will focus on developing quality plans in Wraparound as a platform for both organization and follow-through. Participants will have an opportunity to discuss the three focus areas of a Wraparound plan including Interventions, Support and Community development. Participants will have the opportunity to rethink their own plans when outcomes are not being realized. Participants will be able to: 1. Define three focus areas: intervention, support & community; and 2. Identify strategies in each of the three areas.
